






What is your age range? *







KidZone: This would make a positive impact on my neighborhood 3495 Responses




KidZone: "This would make a positive impact on my neighborhood" filtered by "Do you have children?"


Library funds are limited (anywhere in this country) and should not be used to provide public Daycare and Pre-School.


Third Place Space: I would use this if it existed




Third Place Space: This would make a positive impact on my neighborhood

I like the concept of late night space. Security concerns come to mind.


Will depend on the layout and amenities at each particular library location.

Just unsure if it would actually be used


Not familiar how this would work but it sounds like a great opportunity to connect outside US. Safety measures would be my only concern but again not sure on details

I like the idea, but normally go to the library with my daughter who is 5 but she is interested in things like learning languages too so if it had kid programming we would enjoy it





Would encourage activities for under-served students. There are so many opportunities already for the high-achieving students in Arl schools, I'm not sure I want to see more investment in activities for them.


No longer a student, nor parent of a student, but students 13-19 particularly seem in need of an offline "third place" more than other demographics might.



See comments above. Great idea but let's avoid duplication.


Wonderful for teens.

Statement such as "Career Compass would be the connective fiber between Arlingtonians and their next career step—big or small, paid or unpaid." may be too ambitious. First, there are plenty of resources - many of them free - that already exist. Second, this type of program would probably work best with entry level jobs or career switchers. I have no expectation that the library is going to help me land my next job as an SVP at a big company - and neither should others. This program could focus on how to enable people to most effectively use the library's research.




Convertible Kit-Cart: This would make a positive impact on my neighborhood





Again, I ask who would be designing and leading this program? Does it also take into account food insecurity and how that might be addressed?


Not clear how this falls under the remit of a library specifically, but seems like a good program in general, sure.






Borrow an Expert: This would make a positive impact on my neighborhood

This seems like something this is "on point" for a library.





Individual private spaces would be preferable, although being a limited resource, not feasible. Such an accommodation would be desirable for anyone--students, media fans, anyone seeking a quiet space. Most individuals don't come to the library to socialize, and most of these ideas seem to challenge that basic assumption.

This is already an essential service: Many of us already use the local library this way, and having a local library where we can print what we need (or use the library computer as well) is critical Please maintain these sevices and equippment and the friendly assistance from the library staff! It would be nice if Arlington could provide free limited copies, as DC libraries do.

I would love this option. However I am a federal employee and May not connect my laptop to public Wi-Fi—it must be password protected. That would make it feasible for me.

As a grad student, I would love this. A good space outside of my home to work.

This somewhat duplicates existing commercial services, but could have lots of community appeal.

If you do have "takeover time," such as for engineers on Tuesdays in the example provided, would there be spaces for those in other realms who wish to use the library to telework?




Community Collective: I would use this if it existed




Community Collective: This would make a positive impact on my neighborhood

Doesn't not seem like something people would embrace. People's schedules are already overloaded.




Arlington Town Square: I would use this if it existed

Better idea than some community offeriings now available.


The last thing Arlington needs is more people arguing over an app. The library is supposed to be about reading, learning and bringing people together in a shared physical space so that they feel part of a community.

See comments about duplication. Has APL discussed any of this with community centers?






"Which of these concepts would you travel to" filtered by Zip Code
